


# Pakistan: Khyber Agency Displacements

## Situation Report No. 5 (as of 26 April 2013)



This report is produced by OCHA Pakistan in collaboration with humanitarian partners. It was issued by OCHA Pakistan. It covers the period from 20 to 26 April 2013. The next report will be issued on or around 3 May.



## Highlights

- The Emergency Response Fund will allocate US\$1 million for the provision of non-food items, health care, food security and protection support to the internally displaced people (IDPs) from the Tirah Valley in Khyber Agency, Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA).
- Humanitarian partners are seeking an additional \$3.5 million from the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) to address the basic needs of the IDPs. More funding will be needed from other donors to sustain assistance to the displaced families.
- According to the FATA Disaster Management Authority (FDMA), the number of the IDPs currently stands at 48,169 people (6,882 families), and could rise to 120,000 people (20,000 families), who are likely to remain in displacement for up to six months due to security concerns.

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## Situation Overview

Humanitarian partners interviewed 1,892 families across Hangu, Kohat, Kurram, Orakzai and Peshawar during an inter-cluster assessment conducted between 17 and 23 April to identify the priority humanitarian needs of the IDPs. More than half of the interviewed families are in Peshawar, where most of the IDPs have reportedly sought refuge. Data review is under way, and the findings will be disseminated in the coming days.

Partners continue to provide critical services in and outside camps to cater to the needs of the IDPs, who lack adequate food, shelter, basic relief items, health care, cash and clean water.

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**Coordination Saves Lives**

Partners have so far registered and verified 7,302 families in Hangu, Jalozai, Kohat, Kurram, New Durrani and Peshawar. These families will receive one-time assistance of food and non-food items. Meanwhile, a total of 169,388 registered families with an estimated 1,016,328 individuals are currently displaced in KP and FATA.

## Funding

The initial estimate of US\$352 million needed to meet the humanitarian requirements of the more than 1 million IDPs in and FATA and 146,400 returnees in 2013 is now being revised by humanitarian partners in line with an adjusted target caseload of 24,400 families, or 25 per cent of government estimates for the year. A revised inter-agency Humanitarian Operational Plan will be finalized soon.

Additional funding is urgently required to address the most pressing needs and bring temporary relief to the displaced families and their host communities and to provide returnee families with transportation support and basic return packages comprising food, hygiene kits and shelter repair kits. Partners have so far received around \$103 million.

## Humanitarian Response

- The FDMA has provided some of the displaced people with hot meals, tents, health care, 360 kits of relief items and transportation. Government health workers have vaccinated 5,959 displaced children and provided health care to 5,096 adults.
- As of 24 April, humanitarian partners had distributed 449 metric tons of food to 4,853 families (including 5 per cent female-headed households) in Hangu, Jalozai, Kohat, Kurram, New Durrani and Peshawar and prepositioned food in various hubs for distribution to more families.
- Partners have provided 740 tents in New Durrani camp and 19,125 kits comprising non-food items (NFIs) such as jerry cans, buckets, cooking utensils, blankets and hygiene kits to displaced families in Hangu, Jalozai, Kohat, Kurram, New Durrani, Nowshera and Peshawar.
- WASH cluster partners continue trucking up to 192,000 litres of water to New Durrani camp daily, providing 10.5 litres per person per day. In addition, water is also provided through a gravity scheme from Tando village stored in four 5,000-litre water bladders. Partners have also rehabilitated most WASH facilities in the camp, distributed 600 hygiene kits and conducted hygiene promotion activities for the new IDPs.
- Protection Cluster partners are supporting IDP registrations, resolution of grievances, relief assistance to groups with specific needs, legal assistance and advice to individuals and groups, psychological support, among other services.

## General Coordination

Humanitarian partners are identifying the priority activities that will be supported by additional funding expected from the CERF to address the basic needs of the IDPs displaced from the Tirah Valley.

Additional registration of off-camp IDPs is expected to commence on 27 April at a newly established hub in the Jarma area of Kohat Division.

### Background on the crisis

Since mid-March, 48,169 people have been displaced from the Maidan area in the Tirah Valley in Khyber Agency, FATA, due to an escalation of hostilities between rival armed groups and the Government's security operations against armed non-state actors. Temporary settlement of the IDPs is expected to follow patterns of previous displacements: between 10 and 15 per cent are expected to move to established camps such as Jalozai in Nowshera District, Togh Sarai in Hangu District and New Durrani in Kurram Agency, while the majority are expected to stay in host communities in the Peshawar Valley. Officials estimate that up to 120,000 people (20,000 families) could be displaced from the insecurity-affected area and remain in displacement for at least six months due to security concerns.

There has been insecurity in FATA during the last decade, with displacements and returns occurring in parallel in different agencies of FATA since 2008. Humanitarian partners are providing assistance to 169,388 displaced families in KP and FATA with an estimated population of 1,016,328 individuals. There are also 1.64 million Afghan refugees receiving humanitarian assistance, and more than 1.3 million people who have returned to FATA since 2009, who require humanitarian assistance.

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
